May 14, 1935 - August 24, 2014

It is with deep and heavy sadness, that we announce the death of Darwin M. Roe who passed away on August 24th 2014. Darwin was born in Long Pine, Nebraska on May 14th 1935 to Cornelius and Vera (Miller) Roe. Darwin spent his younger years in Cortez, Colorado. In 1955 he married his high school sweetheart, Leora Stanley. The following year, Darwin began his military career, proudly serving his country in the Army National Guard beginning in 1956 and rose to the rank of Command Sergeant Major; later retiring in 1996. In 1972 he moved his family to Fort Collins, Colorado where he spent the next 36 years, then in 2009 he moved to Pierce, Colorado.

Darwin is preceded in death by his wife, Leora Stanley Roe, his father Cornelius Roe, mother Vera Roe brother Darrell (Peggy) Roe, sisters: Lavona Roe, Irma Powell, Vada (J.E.) Small, Lilly (Darwin) James, and Stanton Stanley. He will be mourned by his wife Maggie Roe, his daughters: Teresa Barnes, Tracy (Mike) Keegan and Natalie Winfrey; grandchildren: Adam (Kristi), Tyler, and Mikka Keegan, Haley and Taylor Barnes, Amber and Abigail Winfrey and great grandchildren: Dakota and Charlie Rice; brother-in-law, Sidney Powell and sister and brother-in-law Lois and Bill Rutledge.

Darwin dedicated his life to playing hard, working hard and loving life. He was always up for the next great adventure and looked for every opportunity to get on his horse and ride; a true cowboy! Intelligent, innovative and determined

“ Darwin Roe
History

Born May 14, 1935 to Corneilus and Vera Roe. His early childhood was spent on his families homestead in Nebraska where Darwin happily terrorized his sisters Lavona, Vada, Irma, Lilly, and Lois. Often locking them into the outhouse. Darwin looked up to his older brother Darrel and occasionally Darrell could influence Darwin's wild streak.

The family took a leap of faith and set out for work in southern Colorado. Darwin took the trip sitting on the cars transmission cover; this resulted in some pretty serious burns. Darwin's work career began early and involved some perilous driving at a young age, his family needed his support and he did what was required. Darwin met Leora Stanley in high school and got off to a rough start with her strict, devoted father when he put his car in a ditch and had to get her father to pull them out.

Their young love blossomed and they made their vows to each other on June 19, 1955 Together they built a wonderful life, working hard and raising two daughters, Tracy and Terri.

Darwin was a patriot joining the army national guard and taking his duty seriously. He was a servant to our country from 1956 to 1996. He achieved the rank of Command Sargent Major.

He worked with Bucky Philips in the electrical trade which inspired him to become a master electrician and begin his own company, High Country Electric. This endeavor brought the family to Fort Collins in 1972. Determined to be a success Darwin worked hard, often away from his family for weeks at a time. HCE is still successful today under the watchful eye of his son-in-law Mike Keegan. Mike wandered into the picture in 1975 and at 15 quickly became the son Darwin hadn't had causing a sigh of relief from Terri who had been the "boy" to that point! Mike worked side by side with Darwin for over 30 years cementing a special relationship. Natalie

Winfrey joined the family in 1981 and her antics were an inspiration to Darwin. No one loved to laugh more than he did and Natalie was a consistent source of entertainment.

Mike notes that Darwin didn't have "can't" in his vocabulary, he could do anything he set his mind to. In his early days he didn't believe in buying anything but could and did build, fix, and design his own solutions. During the course of their time working together people often commented to Mike saying; "Darwin is one of the smartest men I have ever met".

Family was a priority for Darwin as his parents, Leora's parents, siblings, MANY nieces, nephews, aunts, uncles and cousins can attest too. The importance of family was never taken for granted! His grandchildren were a source of constant delight, he loved them with a passion not matched by any other relationship. Adam, Tyler, Mikka, Haley, Taylor, Amber, Abigail, Dakota and Charlie received the warmth of his love and the power of his conviction. Critical to Darwin's mission was imparting a sense of fun and work held together with a lot of dirt and some horse manure.

When Mike and Tracy announced their no guns rule Darwin promptly bought his grandchildren b-b guns for Christmas! This is just the way our world works! Every child should have someone like Darwin Roe in their life.

Even though Terri and her children, Haley and Taylor, lived far from Darwin or as they called him, "Granddad Roe Roe" it didn't keep him from creating memories. From building a surprise zipline in their backyard in Kentucky to spending time in Colorado sharing his player piano, riding horses and cleaning stalls, these moments will last a lifetime.

While family was number one it was not limited to blood relationships, Levoine Humphreys, Mike Beaird, Angie and Ron Jensen, Stacey Miller, Linda Davis, Linda Greenman and many of you here today were and always will be considered family.

The animal family that Darwin accumulated was equally important. He took great pleasure in the training of his dogs and horses and they rewarded his efforts with a tremendous loyalty. Chico, Fred, Barney, F.D (Continued Below...)

A source of great pride and a personal challenge was Darwin's trip from steam boat springs to Durango with nothing but 3 horses, the supplies they could carry and his wits. During this time Darwin proved his stamina and quit smoking, something he was very proud of.

Leora passed away under Darwin's loving care in 1999. Darwin was lost without his childhood love.

Several years later Darwin met his second love, Maggie. Maggie and Darwin were married in June of 2009. They made a home for themselves in Pierce Co where the laughter and hard work continued. We thank Maggie for making Darwin's last year's happy ones and for the loving care she provided during his difficult illness. Their time together was too short.

Darwin has touched so many lives in such a positive way! Larger than life, opinionated, passionate, and always right are just a few ways to describe Darwin Roe. Tracy tells me that she has lost count of the number of people that have approached her to tell her of their respect for her father.

Terri's most helpful life lessons –

What Darwin's daughter, Terri learned from her father was a direct result of their constant involvement with animals. As a teen Terri shared Darwin's passion for horses. She attributes her breeder's cup racehorse, spreading her wings to travel and eventually creating a family of her own in Kentucky to her fathers never ending support to all things horse. It all started on his small farm in Fort Collins. Through her father's love of animals, Terri learned about unconditional love, empathy, kindness, and commitment. He was

known to love big dogs best, but when he met Terri's little Chihuahua named Mick; well it turns out the big tough cowboy loved all animals big and small and they loved him back.

Tracy's most helpful life lesson –

In response to a glowing work review Darwin said don't worry honey; it will be better next time. Confused she asked what he meant and he said that the people who offer criticism are the ones that care and are invested in your success. He was sure she would find someone that cared enough to criticize her some day!

Natalie's most helpful life lesson-

Darwin often said "Knockers up" to me often while teaching me to ride. It was his way of getting me to sit straight up on a horse or at a table. Along with that was his desire to embarrass me by placing a broomstick down the shirt and into the back of a boyfriends pants if he wasn't sitting up at the table. He embarrassed my boyfriend only once, that's all it took. I cannot list the many life lessons that he taught me over the years as the list is too long.

The desired result was helping us to consider that having patience with people that don't think like we do is important - this one was confusing since Darwin did not seem to practice this advice; as a matter of fact one of his most common declarations was "you dumb son of a _____"

Side benefit - making us smile as we headed out the door

Get back on that horse

This wasn't just offered when we had "fallen" off of a horse but came in handy for a bicycle wreck, a bad grade, or a broken heart.

The desired result was instilling in us the knowledge that it was what

we do next that counts and we are in charge

Side benefit - today - getting us through the loss of such an influential man

The 6 P's - prior planning prevents piss poor performance

Goal making us think

Side benefit pointing out when we failed to plan in order to have a laugh at our expense

We will miss him without a doubt but will get back on our horse and make him proud!
