Patricia Craig Johnson, age 82, died on February 11 at Medical Center of the Rockies in Loveland, Colorado.

She was born June 29, 1935 to Gerald Vuhr Craig and Dorothy Cary Craig in Ottumwa, Iowa. She attended school in Gering, Nebraska. On August 30, 1952, she married Richard W. Meier in Scottsbluff, Nebraska and they were later divorced. They had two daughters, Cindy L. Lewis (Mrs. Don) and Laurie Meier. On September 23, 1983 she married John E. Johnson in Loveland, Colorado. She was a member of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, Daughters of the American Revolution Friday's Council Tree Chapter, Daughters of Union Veterans, Sunflower Chapter of Eastern Star in Nebraska, and Larimer County Genealogical Society. She moved to Colorado in 1971 and worked at AMF Head Ski Co in Boulder for ten years. She was an employee of Hewlett Packard Company in Loveland, Colorado for sixteen years. She was a teacher of genealogy and a family history writer.

She is survived by her daughters, Cindy (Don) Lewis and Laurie Meier; grandchildren, Chad Lewis, Ryan Lewis, and Logan Currie; great-grandchildren, Jackson and Grant Lewis, Oliver and Stella Lewis, and Kiko Panetta; and a multitude of close friends.

Graveside services will be held on Friday, February 23, at 11 am at Grandview Cemetery in Fort Collins, Colorado, with reception to follow at 12 pm at the Swallow Ward Church in Fort Collins.

“ MEMORIES OF PAT JOHNSON

We were deeply saddened and shocked by Pat Johnson's passing on February 11, 2018. We have very fond memories of Pat as the consummate genealogist and presenter of family history information to public audiences. Much of our contact with Pat was when we were education chairs of the Larimer County Genealogical Society, and Pat was a frequent presenter, especially at the Loveland Library. Pat enjoyed developing new family history topics, including intermediate as well as introductory genealogy, using Google for genealogy, using land records with Ceil Damschroder, and several other topics. Although we were more advanced genealogists than most the attendees at Pat's workshops, we always enjoyed attending, learned new information, and enjoyed her engaging style, excellent PowerPoint slides, and useful handouts.

I also benefited from Pat's help with my personal Colonial family history at the Fort Collins Family History Center and in separate discussions on other occasions. Pat was always eager to help others and did so frequently.

As a member of the LCGS nomination committee and several years ago, I nominated Pat to be Vice president and program chair, which she willingly accepted even though it cut into her personal family history research and time to prepare and present workshops to others.

“ Pat was a very special person; it's hard to believe that I won't see her again at DAR and at Larimer County Genealogical Society meetings. She was such a presence, and neither organization will be the same without her.

I met Pat through genealogy, and she and I shared years of conversations about our latest finds and those ever-elusive ancestors that we just couldn't locate, although I think that Pat had fewer brick walls than most. She was a fantastic, thorough researcher who could ferret out the most obscure details. For several years, she and I volunteered to help find the stories of the lives of some of the early folks buried at Grandview Cemetery. One of Pat's attributes was the inability to rest when there was a project that needed to be done, so when the requests would come via email to work on a new person, it was amazing to see how quickly she'd jump into action. She'd often have a complete bio researched and written before I'd even started to think how to proceed. She was just that quick and efficient.

Somehow Pat seemed larger than life to those of us who met her in these later years; she was the heart and soul of any organization she belonged to. It was always a little bit of a shock to walk into a meeting and realize, once again, how physically small Pat was and how soft spoken. She packed an immense personality of love of life into such a small package.

Pat's passion was genealogy, and I heard her say many times that she hoped her ancestors were prepared, because one of these days she had a lot of questions for them on the other side. I hope that they're answered all of her questions now and that all of the genealogical puzzles she spent so many years trying to figure out are all solved for her now.

Like everyone who knew Pat, I'll miss her greatly, but I treasure the memories I have of her.

She did hours of research on the Johnson family lines and we now know more about our ancestors. Thank You Aunt Pat!



Pat was Always, ALWAYS, going out of her way to help someone with a problem, to be a comfort and a friend to the lonely, to serve others in any way she possibly could. Pat was several generations ahead of me in computer skills and I recall a particular incident where I could not resolve a problem.
