Gil Ellerby, 76 of Fort Collins, passed away Saturday, April 30, 2016 at his home surrounded by family and friends.

A Memorial Mass to celebrate his life will be held at 11:00 am, Monday, May 30th at Saint Joseph's Catholic Church in Fort Collins. A reception will be served in Meredith Hall immediately following the service. A rosary will be said in his honor prior to the Memorial Mass.

Gil was born November 18, 1939 in Whittier, California to Alfred and Lucille (Smith) Ellerby. He graduated from the University of Wyoming in 1960 with a BS in Industrial Engineering. On February 2, 1963 he married the former Marcelle Therese Sonnier in Houma, LA. Gil spent many years in the manufacturing industry with jobs at 3M and Voicelt. Gil spent countless hours coaching various little league and bowling teams because he enjoyed working with young children. Gil's love of kids and passion for learning led him to be the founder of the Youth Bowlers Tour where special friendships were made, good sportsmanship was learned and respect was of the utmost importance. He was a sometimes father and grandfather to many young children in the Fort Collins area. After his retirement, he started a second career and became a substitute teacher because he wanted to make a difference in the lives of

many. He enjoyed golfing, traveling and spending time with family and friends. Gil was a large presence but a gentle giant with a deep voice, infectious laugh and a caring heart. There is a hole in the hearts of many because of their love for this wonderful man.

Gil is survived by his loving wife of 53 years, Marcelle Ellerby, his son, Charles Martin Ellerby and his wife Sally also of Fort Collins, his daughter Kristine Dawn Curtis of Fairfax, VA, and five grandchildren he adored: Robert, Danielle, Samantha, Christian and Andrew.

The first thing everyone experienced with Gil was that he was a Big man. What was remarkable was how big he was in all aspects of his life. He was tall and had a large, deep voice, but he was also Large in many other ways. He was intelligent, confident, loyal, kind, honest, trustworthy, friendly, generous and a good sport. He was also very competitive and enjoyed baseball, bowling and golf. And cards! He was excellent at bridge, cribbage, poker and any other card game he played. If you played for money, Gil would usually win. He told me that he essentially paid his way through college playing poker.

He was a hard worker from a very early age. He told me his toughest job was rough necking in the oil fields of Wyoming. And that he almost died in a roll-over accident heading from the oil field to a date. But that was not to be.

He excelled and finished high school early and also graduated early from college. He enlisted with the Air Force and became an officer. He tried to become a pilot and passed all the entrance tests, but alas, he was too tall for the job.

After the service he was a Superintendent of a lithoplate manufacturing process, a specific Line of Business for 3M company. He made many friends on the shop floor and knew most of the names of each workers and of their family members.

When he left 3M, the Ellerby family relocated to Fort Collins, CO. Gil participated in many different endeavors and the highlight was his time with the startup business Voice IT. He was a contributor from the word go and told me that he probably did just about every kind of task that came up no matter what level of work it was. He really enjoyed the people and always had high expectations and gave encouragement.

Giving encouragement was another large part of Gil. He coached baseball and bowling. Many of his protégés have given tremendous testimony to how big of difference he made in not only learning the game but also in developing proper etiquette and sportsmanship. He valued the trait of always having a plan or a target even if it would frequently change.

Perhaps his true calling came after he retired when he began substitute teaching. He loved to teach mathematics and problem solving to 2nd through 4th grades and tutoring individual students (and their parents if needed).

He was big in generosity too. Each year he would give some kind of 'gift' to the catholic schools he taught in such as providing 'Smart boards' in several class rooms.

Gil became a friend nearly everywhere he went. We would frequent various eating places, such as McAllister's and McDonalds, and in each he came to know the servers and returning patrons not by just by name but as friends and family.

He was an easy, fun person to spend time with.

Most people were astounded by the total recall he had for the classic movies and TV shows of yesteryear. He often could name all the main characters and also their birth names. I'm sure he memorized every Star Trek show and most of the others. In fact, he was often on the same side of issues as Archie Bunker. He also liked the Partridge Family because he had a secret crush on Shirley Jones.

Gil also had maybe more than his share of adversity.

You may know that Gil and Marcy lost two children.

He had several serious car accidents, and talk about surgeries and injuries!!! Broken ribs several times, shoulder surgeries, knee surgeries, back surgery, stomach surgeries. Throughout each of these I admired how pain tolerate he was. When the end was near and he said he was in pain, I can only imagine how bad it really

was.

But there was also the Bigger side of life for Gil and Marcy. They extensively and we often vacationed together. He would say that some of the most memorable were a trip going to Australia, New Zealand and Fiji and enjoying New Years eve at Sydney Harbor, snorkeling
