May 9, 1922 - July 25, 2011

Shirley Sears Melvin died July 25, 2011, in Fort Collins, Colo. She was 89. Born in Brooklyn, N.Y., on May 9, 1922, Shirley lived in Fort Collins since 1992. She was a proud veteran of World War II, serving as cryptographer in the Women's Army Corps. Shirley spent the war years decoding strategic communications from her post in Bermuda. She was fond of recalling her trip home to the U.S., after the war, in the nose of a B-17 bomber. Shirley was a passionate and active participant in veteran organizations including the VFW Auxiliary and the Women's Army Corp Veterans Association. She served as commander of the Queens County American Legion Women's Post in New York. Later, she organized and directed Veterans Day celebrations at the Fort Collins Senior Center for many years. She was a faithful member of John XXIII Catholic Church. Shirley volunteered with Boy Scouts of America and Incarnation Church in New York. In Colorado, she volunteered regularly at hospitals, churches and the senior center. A number of times, Shirley spoke enthusiastically to students at McGraw Elementary School about her wartime experiences. Shirley was a constant presence at her grandchildren's sports games, band concerts and birthday parties. A seasoned traveler in her retirement, she particularly enjoyed visiting Europe, China and the Panama Canal. Shirley is survived by her three daughters, Maureen Dieterich of Fort Collins, Anne Wakeford of Brewster, N.Y., and Ellen Melvin of Vero Beach, Fla.; her three sons, William Melvin of West Shokan, N.Y., Edward Melvin of Seattle, Wash. and Richard Melvin of Redding, Calif. She also leaves behind

nine grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. She was preceded in death by her husband, William A. Melvin, her son, Charles Melvin, and her second husband, Stan Barrett. Well done, you good and faithful servant. Rest in peace.

I attended the funeral services that lasted two days in Ft. Collins. As we all know Mrs. Melvin was a planner and even planned her funeral down to the smallest of details.

It was my first funeral in Colorado, so I did not know what to expect. And I was surprised.

Before the services, I met-up with Billy, Eddie and Rich (max) outside the Hilton hotel briefly. They all had shirts, ties and jackets on. My first surprise, haven't seen that before!

They took off to the church where Mrs. Melvin was being waked. Second surprise, a wake at the church.

I arrive a bit later and met with Anne and Maureen, Maureen lives in Ft Collins and has been watching and caring for Mrs. Melvin for many years, along with Bill her husband and two children Peter and Chris. Peter has two children, Mrs. Melvin's great grand kids.

The family would drop by on a regular basis, kind of a tag team approach. They all lived out of state with Bill and Anne in New York, Rich in California, Eddie in Seattle and Ellen in Florida.

Over the years Mrs. Melvin was very involved in veterans' affairs and acted as honor guard for others that have passed before her and served in the military.

As you know, Mrs. Melvin's always took notes and took ideas form

these other funerals that she liked.

She planned the entire funeral and made sure the kids had her to do list, that they followed it without any deviation.

My next surprise was she was wearing a military uniform and had many pictures of her life including Mr. Melvin's pictures, one where he was also wearing a military uniform.

Then to my complete and utter surprise was a pair of small brown baby shoes. Anne saw I was surprised and walked over to explained to me, that was her brother Charles shoes' who had died before Rich and her were born. I knew the Melvin's for more than 45 years and didn't know that.

The wake ended about nine pm and I was invited back to Maureen's house with the rest of the Melvin clan. Everyone was in good spirits and we threw down a few drinks. Maureen had a real nice spread of food on her kitchen counters and we all sat out on her deck talking, eating and drinking.

The next day (Friday at 11am) we all met back at the church for the funeral mass. Even the priest was selected by Mrs. Melvin and during the mass he talked about her and was very accurate.

When he was done, he invited the family up to talk about their mom. Even he was shocked when the entire family got up to talk, (one of Mrs. Melvin's wishes)

They all spoke haltingly, taking deep breaths and muster thru including her grandchildren, Peter and Chris.

Then another surprise as the family followed the casket out of the church there was a full military honor guard with guns. Her casket now draped in the US flag, stopped at a rifle with the bayonet stuck in the ground and an army helmet on the top of the rifle.

A bugler blew taps and the honor guard fired a 21 gun salute (very loud). The Sergeants removed the flag from the casket, folded the flag in proper military fashion and presented the folded flag to Maureen.

Then Rich, Ed, Billy, Bill (Maureen's husband) Peter and Chris escorted the casket to the hearse where Mrs. Melvin would be taken to be cremated (her wish)

At a later date, not yet known, Mrs. Melvin's ashes will be flown to NY and be buried with Mr. Melvin with a grave side ceremony.

Getting the entire Melvin family together may take some time and even till next summer;

Mrs. Melvin wants them all there.
